Director L. Peter Callender focuses the AASC production of CINDERELLA on children. "A *Christmas Carol* is a show that adults can take their children to. But our CINDERELLA is a holiday show *that children can take adults to*," he explains.

"There are lots of children in the show, singing and dancing, and having a great time with Cinderella, Prince Charming, and all the other kids in the audience. The rags-to-riches story we know today as "Cinderella" can be traced to many stories and legends dating back to ancient China. Today, some 1,500 variations of the story exist. Charles Perrault's French version of the tale, which was written to entertain the 17th-century court of Louis XIV, is the basis for the Western versions of the Cinderella tale, and the basis of the '50s Disney film. However, the AASC version, while true to the well-known characters (except for the drag step-sisters) is totally a new and different take on the classic. AASC wrote this version, which empowers children to be all they can be. It's fun, it's madcap, it's tuneful and energetic, and as Callender says, "kids just love it!"
